#### **COLLECTION HIGHLIGHT**

#### LAVINIA WICOFF'S WEDDING DRESS CA. 1904

When Lavinia Applegate married John V. B. Wicoff in 1904, she wore a delicate wedding dress consisting of a separate bodice and skirt. The bodice, shown here, has a lace collar and chiffon sleeves. Its original color was probably ivory.

After their wedding, J. V. B. and Lavinia Wicoff set off on a fantastic honeymoon. They traveled west by train to visit the Grand Canyon. Later, they took a stagecoach from San Francisco to Yosemite Park, and then boarded a cruise ship traveling along the coast to Alaska. The final leg of their journey took them by train to St. Louis to attend the 1904 World's Fair.

They settled back home into their lives in Plainsboro and raised seven children in the Wicoff House.



Lavinia's wedding dress and wedding shoes were donated to the Wicoff House Museum by her grandson, John Wicoff, in 2020.
